### **Introduction (Times New Roman, 12 font size, bold, Sentence case)**

The introduction should present (1) the scope (2) objective/s of the paper (3) the problem, and (4) a brief review of the pertinent literature.

### **Methodology**

The methodology must be clearly stated and described in sufficient details or with sufficient references. The author should explain the research question, describe the research framework, and the methods applied in detail. Furthermore, it should highlight why the research question is relevant to theory and practice, and why the chosen method(s) are suited for the problem.

### **Findings**

The arguments and findings are described in detail in this section.

### **Conclusion**

Conclusion should include (1) the principles and generalizations inferred from the results, (2) any exceptions, problems or limitations of the work, (3) theoretical and/or practical implications of the work, and (4) conclusions drawn and recommendations.

### **References**

References should be listed in the alphabetical order, and presented in a format according to the APA referencing style. The number of references should be limited to eight (08).
